As part of an interview, Linka can discuss:

- How her books are an exploration of what it would be like if American girls were suddenly forced to live with the same restrictions on their choices that face many women in developing nations.
- How having unequal numbers of females and males affects societies.
- How dowries and bride prices affect human behavior.
- The strong themes of women's rights in this series.
- The political implications in the novel and whether the Paternalist party is meant to represent conservatives, liberals, or neither. And why.
- How her background in international politics, master's degree in business, and years of sales, marketing and advertising influenced the writing of this series.
- How regional differences would affect the way that women are treated in the US (Red state Paternalism vs. Blue State Paternalism).
- How society and brokers would determine a girl's value and what this says about our society. All-American girls are more valuable than imports, and auction houses rank girls based on Profile, Position, Progeny and Virginity:

Profile: how a girl's natural bone structure matches what the human eye determines to be perfection.

Position: a loose formula that takes into account the head of household's earning power and assets, combined with his connections to influential political or business decision-makers.

Progeny: the likelihood her DNA will produce a line of children with beauty, intelligence, health, and athleticism.
